

Building Resilient Communities in Somalia (BRCiS) RESTORE Endline Report

Summary

The RESTORE Building Resilience in Northern Somalia Consortium (herein referred to as RESTORE) was implementing a three-year program in Somaliland and Puntland with the involvement of four of its Consortium Members, consisting of Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), Save the Children International (SCI), alongside local organisations such as Candlelight for Environment, Education and Health (Candlelight) and KAALO. The programme aimed to strengthen the resilience of drought-affected communities and IDP households. The following report presents the analysis of the baseline and endline surveys conducted between April 2018 and November 2020, relying on a statistical sample of 2,146 households. The primary focus of the report is to better understand the shock exposure, resilience capacities and well-being of RESTORE communities. - Households Demographics Considering key demographical changes in the study population, there was a 10 percentage point (pp) increase in the share of respondents who were heads of households, which grew from 72% to 81% between the baseline and the endline survey. The average age of the heads of household was 40 years, while the households size averaged 7 across both surveys. The percentage of literate household heads slightly rose from 41.5% to 52.5%. In line with this trend, there was a notable, close to 10 pp growth, in the share of literate household members, which improved from 30.4% to 39.4% by the end of the programme.
- Income & Expenditure The fraction of respondents with female members contributing to household income grew noticeably from 25.6% in baseline to 31.9% in the endline, similar to that of share of male income-earners, which rose from 61.5% to 66.5%. About key expenditure patterns, the percentage of households where all household income was spent on food dropped from 26.1% to 12.1%.
- **Debt, Savings & Credit** Comparisons between the baseline and endline data showed small but encouraging trends in households' savings capacities and debts. For instance, in Togdheer region, the fraction of households with cash and in-kind debt both dropped from 93.7% to 82% and from 80.9% to 72.9%, respectively. Sanaag region oversaw changes of similar magnitude during the project. Further, the endline found that more than two-thirds of respondents had access credit when needed, mainly through shopkeepers or traders. In a welcome trend, the share of households who were able to save have increased from 3% to 9.2% on average. Field staff attributed the increased saving capacity recorded across all regions to: a good rainy season which meant a good harvest; project support to women on VSLA which contributed to increased access to cash; large cash transfers and food assistance programing which reduced the sale of livestock thus creating an opportunity for livestock to regenerate and small businesses to grow; credit schemes and entrepreneurship skills trainings; and regular monitoring of the beneficiaries.
- **Food security -** On average, the Food Consumption Score (FCS) improved impressively from 26.5 to 40.1 between the baseline and endline. This trend was consistent across



different project areas and livelihoods. Key to note is that still, about one in ten households were still food insecure by the end of the programme. Further, about half of the surveyed households experienced food shortages within the previous year of the endline survey, which fell from 73.2% as reported during the baseline survey. The decrease was marked across all regions except in Maroodi jeex, which recorded a 39.5 pp rise in food shortages. Consultations with field staff operating in Maroodi jeex found that floods and locust invasion occurred in the area few months before the endline survey was carried out therefore the reported food shortages. In contrast, the percentage of households that reported to have food stocks increased from 20.4% to 30% on average, though the progress was somewhat uneven across project locations with Bari and Maroodi jeex regions experiencing more significant shortages.

- **WASH** The share of households with sufficient drinking water during drought went up remarkably from 17.7% to 37.2% between the baseline and endline. This improvement was present across all regions except Maroodi jeex. In a similar trend, the share of households with sufficient water for other uses (not drinking) during drought rose from 15% to 34%. Strikinally, this means that access to water remained an acute issue for about twothird of programme beneficiaries by the end of the project. Concerning hygiene practices, latrine use reportedly rose from 41% to 60%. Field staff attributed the decrease in open defection across all regions to sensitization of the community on the effects of open defecation on contamination of their water sources. When hygiene is linked to assets that community consider valuable to them and the link for contamination is clearly demonstrated, there is better adoption of good hygiene and sanitation practices. In regards to disposal of household waste, the percentage of households who dispose their waste by either use of bins or garbage collection increased by 1.8pp (from 0.7% to 2.5%) and 3.9pp (from 11.6% to 15.5%) respectively between the survey rounds. This translated to a decrease in the number of households who dispose their waste in water points, open places or pits during the endline survey.
- Household Resilience Capacities Overall, surveyed households exhibited less intense distress strategies during the endline survey, as measured by the Reduced Coping Strategy Index (CSI-R), indicating better food security and resilience. On average, CSI-R dropped from 14.9 in the baseline to 10.1 in the endline survey. In Togdheer, Nugal, Sanaag and Awdal regions, it decreased by 4.2, 5.6, 7.1, 13.9 respectively between the survey rounds. In regards to assets, the average Household Asset Score (HAS) revealed a small increase from 26.1 to 26.8. This increase was recorded across all regions with Awdal region overseeing the highest increase from 42.5 in baseline to 65.3 in the endline survey. Field staff attributed the increase in HAS across all regions to; large cash and food assistance programing which reduced the sale of livestock thus creating an opportunity to for livestock to regenerate and small businesses to grow; a good harvest due to good rains in mid 2018-2019; restocking and VSLA cash start up provided by the project.
- Community Resilience Capacities In terms of village-level support received, the percentage of respondents that agree that their village is capable of assisting households in difficulty rose from 31.1% to 46.6% between the baseline and endline. With improved savings and better food security status, this may have also added to the capacity and confidence to help others. Still, two in five respondents believed their villages are unable to assist them in times of drought while 23% believed their villages are unable to assist them in times of flooding during the endline survey.



Introduction

Funded by the European Commission's Directorate-General for International Cooperation and Development (DEVCO,) RESTORE is a three-year resilience programme implemented by the Building Resilient Communities in Somalia (BRCiS) Consortium. BRCiS was founded in 2013 with the aim of improving the resilience of rural communities and IDP households in Central and South Somalia. Expanding on the Consortiums past activities, the overall objective of RESTORE is to strengthen the resilience capacities of vulnerable communities in Somaliland and Puntland, which is to be primarily realized by sustainably improving their food security and livelihood. As for the Consortium's programmatic approach, RESTORE seeks to balance the need for timely humanitarian assistance in response to specific shocks and stresses with the long-term strategy of building local capacity to deal with similar shocks in the future. As such, it is intended to serve as a crisis modifier helping communities to withstand shocks and enhance their absorptive capacities in the long-term. The program targets 126,474 drought-affected pastoralists, agro-pastoralists, urban poor and IDPs (19,899 HHs) in 27 communities across Togdheer, Awdal and Maroodi jeex regions (Burao, Baki and Sabowanag & Gabiley districts respectively) of Somaliland, and Bari, Nugaal and Sanaag regions (Bosaso, Dangoronyo and Badhan districts respectively) of Puntland. Further, RESTORE is implemented by four organizations: Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) and Save the Children International (SCI) alongside local organizations such as Candlelight for Environment, Education and Health ("Candlelight") and KAALO.

Survey methodology

To set a basis for measuring programme impact, a baseline survey was conducted between 22nd April and 14th May 2018 interviewing 2,146 households. An endline survey was conducted between 14th October and 6th November 2020 interviewing 1,929 households. The sample of the baseline exercise consists of 1,099 surveys in Somaliland and 1,047 interviews in Puntland, covering seven and eight project locations, respectively. The sample of the endline exercise consists of 881 surveys in Somaliland and 1,048 interviews in Puntland.

Sampling

Out of the 27 villages participating in RESTORE, 15 communities were identified to be sampled as part of the baseline and endline assessment. Communities were selected based on the key characteristics of their profile, such as: dominant livelihood strategies, population size, prevalence of IDPs and vulnerability concerning access to essential services. The underlying logic in selecting the villages to be sampled was to ensure that each village profile is represented in the sample frame (for instance, urban IDPs with limited water access, agro-pastoralist with a high proportion of IDPs, etc.). Next, the sample was calculated at the village level for each of the selected locations, using a confidence interval of 95%, with a maximum 7 % margin of error (see Table 1). Within the sampled communities, the selection of households was conducted through systematic



random sampling (a type of probability sampling method in which individuals are selected based on a fixed, periodic interval starting from an arbitrary point). One merit of the sampling approach employed is that it provides a statistically representative sample at the village level — assuming that the demographic profile of those randomly selected matches the demographic profile of the population being sampled — thereby allowing the comparative analysis of selected communities.

Questionnaire development, data collection and training of enumerators

Concerning training of enumerators on the tool, SCI conducted training between 4th and 5th October for a total of 14 enumerators, while NRC and Candlelight did the training between 14th and 16th October for a total of 6 and 5 enumerators respectively. As for the timeline of the endline, the data collection started on the 14th of October and ended on the 6th of November 2020. The endline data was collected and stored on the ONA platform, which were cleaned and anonymized as a preparation for survey analysis.

Data cleaning

353 short surveys (less than 15 minutes) and nine non-consented interviews were excluded from the analysis. In total, 3,778 (2,211 baseline and 1,567 endline) interviews were analyzed.

Survey findings

Demographics

1. Respondent's gender

In general, 81% and 75% of the respondents were females during the baseline and endline surveys respectively. This percentage was representative of the regions with an exception of Maroodi jeex region which had more male than female respondents during both the baseline and endline surveys.

Unemployment, lack of water and lack of food were the main challenges that the households were currently facing during both baseline and endline surveys. The percentage
